

In 2018, Don Davis Voted Against Giving North Carolinians The Choice To Historically Lower State Income Taxes

In 2018, Davis Voted Against A Ballot Initiative For A North Carolina Constitutional Amendment That Would Lower The State Income Tax Cap From Ten Percent To Seven Percent

SB 75 Was A Proposed Amendment To The North Carolina State Constitution That Would Have Lowered The State Income Tax Cap From Ten Percent To Seven Percent. AN ACT TO AMEND THE NORTH CAROLINA CONSTITUTION TO PROVIDE THAT THE MAXIMUM TAX RATE ON INCOMES CANNOT EXCEED SEVEN PERCENT. The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts: SECTION 1. Section 2 of Article V of the North Carolina Constitution reads as rewritten: "Sec. 2. State and local taxation. ... (6) Income tax. The rate of tax on incomes shall not in any case exceed ~~ten~~ seven percent, and there shall be allowed personal exemptions and deductions so that only net incomes are taxed. SB 75 Passed In The North Carolina State Senate On June 28, 2018, And Was Approved To Be Added To Ballots Statewide For The 2018 General Election. (SB 75, [Roll Call #775](#): Passed 47-13, 6/28/18, Davis Voted No)
